Year 1 have musical 'little fingers'!

Our year 1 pupils have thoroughly enjoyed learning alongside Elaine from Durham Music Service this halfterm in their 'little fingers' provision.

The sessions build up young children's understanding of rhythm, tempo and dynamics in music through games and songs. Using both untuned percussion and tuned instruments, the y1 children are able to distinguish between different rhythms through careful listening.

This skill continues to build across school as the children listen to more and more pieces over time, paying close attention to what they can hear.

Children in year 2 spend a term focusing on world percussion; this year it has been the rhythms of Brazil on the samba drums which will culminate in a performance for parents.

Our juniors all learn the recorder and build up to 8 note pieces by the end of Y6.

You will get to see examples of our musical talents at the school summer picnic on 5th July.

A focus on the subject of geography

We are incredibly proud of the broad and ambitious curriculum offer the pupils at West Rainton receive.

The subject of geography, led in our school by Miss Kelly, lays a foundation for so many future careers and life skills.

As well as gaining a deep understanding of the world around them; continents, capitals, flags, populations, climate etc, the children also study human geography such as trade, economics, environmental issues and natural disasters. This begins right from nursery when children are encouraged to take active notice of their local area.

In our school, geography is taught in halftermly blocks to all year groups from Y1 — Y6.

A key component of geography is fieldwork and this year there has been a big push on

skills of studying and documenting the local environments as well as map and compass work.

Miss Kelly has great links with Belmont School's geography lead and he has been in to run CPD for staff as well as bringing along some of the secondary students from geography club to mentor our y4/5s.

Our next steps with geography development are to look at how we assess children's knowledge and skills over time.
